

A genealogy cohort of the author, MRS. ROBERT ALLEN OWENS (THEMA), sent the following information from CALDWELL CO. N.C. HERITAGE BOOK: There was a THOMAS LAXTON, SR. born in Scotland who came to America about 30 years before the Rev. War. He married JANE WILSON of VA. and moved to Holman's Ford in Wilkes Co., N.C., which is now Caldwell Co. He died there of small pox. He had three children, THOMAS LAXTON, who went west and was never heard from; ELIZA M. COFFEY, who had no children; and LEVI I. LAXTON, who in 1763, was in the Rev. War at age 13. He was GENERAL CLEVELAND'S sword-bearer in the Battle of Kings Mt. At one time he was guard for GENERAL GREEN. He married NANCY TILLEY and settled at Kings Creek, N.C. They had 8 children, THOMAS III who married POLLY CARLTON; WILSON; LEVI, JR.; TILLEY; ALLEN who married MARY POWELL; MARGARET; SALLIE; and CELIA. [122]

MRS. OWENS found 9 entries for THOMAS LAXTON in the Land Entry Book for Wilkes Co., N.C. 1778-1781. One dated 8 Dec. 1778 gave the location of 100 acres on Lewis Fork up the line made by JOHN LAXTON and WILLIAM MITCHELL. She found THOMAS LAXTON in the 1820 census for Hickman Co., Tn., 26-45 years old. He was still in the same Co. in 1830 as 50-56 years old. There was also a JAMES LAXTON in Hickman Co., Tn. in 1820 who was 45 & up and in Jackson Co., Tn. in 1830 as 50-60. He was in Hardin Co., Tn. in 1840 as 70-80. There was a JESSE LAXTON in Buncombe Co., N.C. 45 & up in 1800 and 70-80 in Jackson Co., Tn. 1830. [122] [Maybe these facts will give someone a headstart for more research.]

There is speculation by some, that THOMAS LAXTON and JANE WILSON are the ancestors of ANNE LAXTON. There is no proof at this time to substantiate this theory.

1850 CENSUS TENNESSEE, Vol. 5 by BYRON & BARBARA SISTLER, Evanston, Illinois 1975, has two RIGNEY households listed on page 212. ISHAM RIGNEY 37 b. Va., JEMIMA 31 b. Tn. The other RIGNEY living in Coffee Co., Tn. in 1850 was JAMES RIGNEY 32 b. Va., CATHARINE 36 b. Va., children: CHARLES 11; SARAH 1/12. [Not the right SARAH, but could be a relative.]

ARLENE D. BELL wrote this author about ISHAM RIGNEY and wife, NANCY, who in 1810, lived in Montgomery Co., Va. (this later became Floyd Co.)

There is a CHARLES RIGNEY, JOHN, WILLIAM, THOMAS, WILLIAM JR., and ROBERT WYNNE listed on a list of tithables taken for Pittsylvania in 1767. [p.276 [7]

It is odd, how so many of this author's ancestors (from every line) migrated in the same groups. Where ever one is found, usually five or six more lines are found.





Page 129 shows JANE RUTH to have letters of Admns. of all and singular goods and chattles of GEORGE RUTH in July 1761. Page 137 has the Inventory of Sale of the Estate of GEORGE RUTH from Granville to A. COLLETT, 700 acres on April 4, 1761. Page 155 has JANE BEBY, wife of JOHN BEBY, summoned to appear at Court to account for how she admin. estate of GEORGE RUTH. More research may turn up a list of children.[22]

CHRISTINE WILLINGHAM SMITH wrote the author that she thinks MARY RUTH is the given name of AUGUSTINE'S wife; her surname missing. She may be right. Please let the author know if you have proof or opinion, either way. [132]

The TALLY/TALLEY name probably came from France. Other spellings are: TAILLIS, TAILLES, TALLIS, TALLYS, TELLY, TALLIE, TALLYE, TAILLEY, TALLEYE, TAULLEY, and TOLLEY. Some of these forms came from England, but may have come from France originally. [13]

Not much is known about JOHN TALLY. He owned land in the Tennessee Counties of: Sullivan, Washington, Grainger, Jackson, and Franklin, from 1780 until his death in 1813, according to

well documented book in 1976 entitled, SOME TALLEY (TALLY)S AND THEIR RELATED LINES. She is a descendant of JAMES RUSSELL, POLINA GAINES, MATTHEW TALLEY, and SARAH CONDRY. [13]

MRS. KOHLER has many land grants listed in her book for JOHN TALLEY. But the one that intrigued this author was from Washington County, Tn. in 1794 between JOHN BEAN, SENR. and JOHN TALLY of Sullivan Co. [13] Could this JOHN BEAN be the father of ROBERT BEAN, the intrepid patriot buried in Marion County, who is also an ancestor of this author? [See RAULSTON & RUSSELL GENEALOGY, #8]

JAMES LEE ROY TALLEY wrote this author that he was attempting to find his ancestor JOHN TALLEY, SR. who married (1) GUERITE SHARP and (2) SARAH JACKSON on 14 June 1812. It is thought he died 1813, leaving 2 sons: JOHN JR. & WILLIAM. Could these be connected to JOHN and REBECCA TALLY?

JOHN TALLEY entered land on the Northern side of the Holston River in 1780 and 1784, so this is probably where MATTHEW was born. MATTHEW was in Grainger Co., Tn by 1804, as he was bondsman for WILLIAM CONDREY when he married NANCY STANLEY. MATTHEW then married SARAH CONDRY on the 25 Nov. 1804. [13]

Grainger Co. 1810 Census shows MATTHEW & SARAH TALLY with 4 children. 1812, they were in Franklin Co., Tn. From Franklin Co., Tn. Deed Book J, p. 165, is an Abstract dated 1-9-1816. "THOMAS HOPKINS of Sullivan of State of Tennessee to MATHEW TALLEY of Franklin County, Tennessee. TALLY bought 165 acres on waters of Wagner's Creek of Elk River... to spring used by BENJAMIN CONDY. Land is part of tract granted to THOMAS HOPKINS 12 Aug. 1815. #7536, Reg. 1-1-1817." [13]

MATTHEW sold his land in Franklin Co. in 1819. Soon after he and his brother, CAPT. JACOB TALLY came to Alabama.

MATTHEW TALLY traded corn and cattle to the Indians for land in Crow Creek Valley, were he built a two story log home. It had a separate kitchen and log smoke house in a desirable setting near a good spring which was covered by a log building. The spring was deep inside the spring-house with 5 or 6 hugh stone steps going down to the spring. There were large rock shelves on each side that were used to keep their food cool. CLEO GONCE SHELTON told this author that she remembered seeing quarters of beef, milk, butter, and apple pies cooling in this spring house as a child. These apple pies were a favorite afternoon snack for them. She said that after a big rain, water would come pouring up those big steps and out the door of the spring house. [130],

Weatherboarding was used, in later years, to cover over the logs. The author played in this vacant house when visiting her GRANDMOTHER GONCE on the next farm before JACK LOYD torn it down in the 1950's to make room for his hog barn. [21]



FRANCES "FRANKIE" WILSON was 22 when her first child was born and 64 when she died. Not one thing is know about her parents. One source said she may have been married to a ROGERS before she married ISAAC, but this author has found nothing to prove that.

There is a THOMAS LAXTON, SR. born in Scotland who came to America around 1745; who married a JANE WILSON of Virginia. There could be a connection between this JANE WILSON and the FRANCES WILSON who married ISAAC GONCE, but just speculation.

This next letter was written by WILLIAM LEROY ROGERS before September 1922 to W.B. ROGERS and wife. Mrs. L.G. Dixon, 216 Columbia S.E., Albuquerque, N.M., sent it to Eunice Matthews Cleburne, Texas in 1958. Betty W. Houston sent it to the author 1986.

W.B. ROGERS and wife Des Moines, New Mexico

Dear Grandson and Grand-Daughter:

It is with pleasure that I undertake to answer your interesting letter announcing your marriage to a MISS ROGERS and of course she did not have to change her name. I am glad that you made choice of one of the good old names of ROGERS. I

assure you that you did not marry kinfolks, for my father, GEORGE ROGERS, was the only child of his father WILLIAM, for whom I was named, He, WILLIAM ROGERS, was in the War of 1812: lost his health and died in 1816, when my father was six months old. So his family is the only descendant of WILLIAM ROGERS. Your Uncle Cicero is a splendid type of my father, GEORGE ROGERS. Rogersville was named for JOE ROGERS, who owned the first hotel in that town. JOE ROGERS was a brother of GEORGE ROGERS, my great grand father, whose home was five miles to Rogerville, Tennessee. My father was born in that community the 24th day of October, 1815. My father's mother was a very beautiful woman, her maiden name was BETTIE GONCE, a better and more useful woman was not to be found in that country. Her father, ISAAC GONCE emigrated to Jackson County, Alabama in about 1818, when my father was about three years old. Old Grand Father GONCE brought BETTIE ROGERS and little boy, GEORGE, to Alabama with his family of seven other daughters and sons. At that time there was a great migration to Alabama and South Tennessee and our people settled along the Tennessee and Alabama line, in fact, the State line ran through the community in which our kinfolk settled. Some on one side and some on the otherside of the line and yet they were neighbors. My grand-mother three years after she emigrated to Alabama, was married to JAMES B MATTHEWS and they had a large family of sons and daughters, but not one is living. JAMES B. MATTHEWS was a very prominent man in his community was quite wealthy in land and Negroes. It was the ambition of all the MATTHEWS of that generation to own Negroes.

Now I have given you a brief sketch of the ROGERS side of the house and will bring the other side up. SAM McCRARY and a very beautiful girl, named BETTY ALLEN, of precious memory, were married when they were quite young. I am very glad to tell you they were my grandfather and grandmother. My dear grandmother died in 1831, two weeks after her child was born, which child was a girl and was named DRUZIE, for whom I named my daughter, DRUZIE. There were 12 children born to them and the first born was WILLIAM born 1806. When his father was 18 years old my great-grandfather, AIAS ALLEN, father of my gread-mother BETTIE was a soldier in the War of the Revolution 1776. ALLENS were very fine people and were well to do, in fact, were wealthy in lands and Negroes. My dear precious mother was of the McCRARY Your father SAM ROGERS, is the best type of my family. grandfather, SAM McCRARY, however, grand-father had as fine head and face as ever saw on any man; but your father is the best likeness of anyone of his descendents. Grand-Father McCRARY was a splendid farmer owned a fine farm and never needed anything always had plenty at home, was at home nearly all the time, was never at his county seat, was never in a court house, never had a case in court in all his life of 87 years. He had a second family by his last wife, five children were born to them but they have all gone the way of all earth, as his first children have gone. I have so far given your connection on the ROGERS side. the ALLENS and McCRARY'S and a little sketch of the MATTHEWS side. But I will give your connection with one of the greatest

families of Middle Tennessee, SHEROD WILLIAMS was the husband of POLLY LOONEY. They were my wife's grand-father and grandmother. They had 21 children, 17 sons and four daughters, 20 of them lived to be grown. I knew about half of them. Great-grandfather WILLIAMS died five [???] hundred miles from home in '35 and was buried there but five years after his death two of his sons went and brought his remains home and laid his body to rest by the side of his dear companion, who had some years before also passed away. I visited their graves before I left that country The inscription was: "I heard a voice from heaven saying, Blessed is the dead that die in the Word, yes saith the Spirit, from henceforth they rest from their labors and their works doth follow them". They were Old Baptist. The WILLIAMS brothers and sisters made quite a success in life and two of them MAT, and JIM were public men. MAT was in the Tennessee legislature when War between the States came up; and his vote defeated the bill to arm the States - you see he was not in favor of the war, in fact, he made speech against going into war. JIM WILLIAMS who married KATE TALLY, over in Jackson County, Alabama on the Tennessee River represented his county in the legislature a number of times. Of the three members that went to the legislature from Old High Jackson, as it was called. JIM WILLIAMS was the middle man and was named the "Average Hog", and that was his nickname as long as he lived. He was a Methodist, MAT WILLIAMS was a Cumberland Presbyterian. JENNIE a favorite sister of the family of sons, married JERRY MATTHEWS, the father and mother of my first wife, SARAH ANN MATTHEWS, who was born April the second, 1837. Her father JERRY MATTHEWS, lived a neighbor to my father when I was born in May the 14th, 1836. My mother said JERRY MATTHEWS was one the best neighbors she ever lived by. He was very wealthy in Negroes and lands. He died in 1847 when his daughter SARAH was 10 years old. JERRY and JENNIE as they were called had a family of three sons and three daughters. They were Methodist and Presbyterians, with the exception of my wife, who came from the Presbyterians to Old Baptist in June 1872, just before we left for Texas the following September, 50 years ago next September. The ALLEN S with the exception 4 or 5 were Free Will Baptist. Grandfather WILLIAM ROGERS was Old Baptist and his wife, my fathers mother, who was the widow of JAMES B. MATTHEWS was an Old Baptist, also her mother FRANCIS GONCE whose maiden name was FRANCIS WILSON, was Old Baptist, you see I am bringing up your connection with a fine old family named WILSON.

FRANCIS WILSON GONCE was my father's grandmother. She is another one of our people of precious memory. She was a member of Crow Creek Church, which was organized at least 100 years ago. A greater woman in the community to the sick and those that were in distress, never lived in all that country than AUNT FRANKIE GONCE, as she was called by her friends and neighbors. That large GONCE family have all since passed away. I will now give you a short sketch of my fathers family. My oldest sister BETTY MADLAN who is about 86, is rather active at that age. She was first born. I was second born, May 14, 1839, therefore I was 94/(83) last May. I joined the Old Baptist Church in Oct. 1828 in

Alabama was married to SARAH GOVER MATTHEWS in November 26, 1860. Ten children were born to us 9 are living and getting along in this world fairly well. I was ordained to the ministery in an Old Baptist Church in 1872 in Franklin County, Tennessee 50 years ago. My brother SAM who passed away a short time ago who was nearly 80 years old and five sisters were and are Old Baptist. I saw my dear father baptized many years ago. When he came up from his watery grave he had a beautiful face, in fact he had an angelic look in his beautiful face. Not one of his mother s children are living. Myself, SAM, JIM, and our father, were in the War between the States. Brother Jim was killed in the Battle Chickamauga. He was a splendid young man of 18 years. Brother JIM had a dream the night before he was killed in the great battle and wanted to relate the dream to Brother SAM; but they were arranging everything to go into battle so Brother SAM would not take time to hear the dream, and after the battle Brother SAM regretted very much that he did not hear the dream. It was imagined that he had a presentiment of his death in his dream. Before I close this scrible I will give you a caution on religion the worlds religion, you perhaps do not understand the difference between the religion of the world and the religion of Christ and his Apostles. It cost more to support the religion of the World than it does to support the government of the world. When you hear preachers begging notice the contras between them and the Saviour, who for our sake became poor, That we through his poverty might be rich. "The foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the son of man hath not where to lay his head". He was a very poor man, but you will never find in all the New Testament that he ever begged for money. The old adage is: "To work and I am too busy to beg, I am not ashamed".

Now I will close, hoping that you can read this badly written letter. I am your affectionate grandfather.

The first account of ABRAHAM WOOD is on the 1624/5 muster of the plantation belonging to CAPTAIN SAMUEL MATHEW, in James City. ABRAHAM is listed as ten years old and that he came, in 1620, to America on the ship, MARGRETT & JOHN. [26] He had come from England as an indentured servant. He worked his way to freedom and soon owned much land. [17]

As SIR WILLIAM BERKELEY made efforts to settle west of the Appalachians, the fur traders were having trouble with the Indians. After the massacre of 1644, he ordered forts built along Virginia rivers. ABRAHAM WOOD built Fort Henry in 1646, near the Appomattox River, which is now called Petersburg. He then led a party into the present day Kentucky and Tennessee. This party of 3 explorers, 2 servants, and a guide, traveled over 1,500 miles. WOOD was one of the earliest of Virginia's explorers. [17]

WOOD was a Justice in 1655, at Charles City Co.; a Burgess from 1652-1656; was given the commission of Major General by SIR WILLIAM BERKELEY in 1675. During Bacon's Rebellion, 1776, he was Commandant of a military establishment in Virginia. [26]

LAST WILL & TESTAMENT OF ABRAHAM WOOD FORT HENRY in the COUNTY of CHARLES CITY in VIRGINIA (1682)

"Being weary and weak but of good and perfect memory, ... desires to be buried in the night by wife. First bequest to daughter, MARY CHAMBERLAIN, of silver tobacco box and plantation with all thereon belonging, known by the name of 'Fleets' in Henrico County and also 300 acres of land known by the name of Ronhonak. To MY GRANDCHILDREN IN LAW; ABRAH JONES; RICHARD JONES; PETER JONES; and WILLIAM JONES, all my lands in Charles City County. To Godson, ABRAHAM ALLEY and his brother, HENRY ALLEY, the 100 acre tract of land on Thomas Runn, to be equally divided." [26]

It has been reported by many researchers that MARGARET WOOD was the daughter of ABRAHAM WOOD. However, the wording of his Will, with "GRANDCHILDREN-IN-LAW," sounds more like MARGARET was his step-daughter. This was a common expression at that time.

There is some confusion on the part of the author about PETER WYNNE. The #2560 PETER WYNNE may have have been the son of a PETER WYNNE, son of #5120 ROBERT WYNNE. In 1606 a CAPTAIN PETER WYNNE came to the colony with LORD DE LA WAR and CAPTAIN NEWPORT on a ship called "Mary and Margaret." He was known as a brave soldier and was very active in the establishment of Jamestown. This PETER died in 1609, so he could not have been the father of ROBERT WYNNE born in 1622. One source reported that ROBERT WYNNE was the grandson of the PETER WYNNE who died in 1609.



ROBERT WYNNE'S Will Abstract reads as follows:

ROBERT WYNNE, of Jordans Parish of Charles City County in Virginia, Gent. Will 1 July, 1675; Proved 15 August, 1678. To be buried in Jordans Church as near as possible to my son ROBERT. My estate in England as follows: To my eldest son THOMAS WYNNE one farm in Whitestaple Parish in Kent near Canterbury, and commonly called Linebett Banckes. ROBERT WYNNE'S youngest son, JOSHUA, was burgess from 1695 to 1702 for Charles City Co.; & he was a major of the militia of Prince George Co. [2], [3]

JOSHUA and his brother, CAPT. THOMAS WYNNE, were Indian interpreters. They accompanied the Nottoway and Meherrin commissioners to make peace with the Seneca Indians in 1702. JOSHUA WYNNE owned 850 acres of land in Prince George Co. in 1704. [2], [7]

Speaking about the Saponey Indians: "Their belief in the ancient custom of an eye for an eye, is illustrated in the following occurrence: MAJOR JOSHUA WYNNE was shot and killed by an Indian because one of our servants had killed one of their great men, and upon the trial of the Indian they pleaded that we were the aggressors and that they never rest without revenge: and that now they said they and we were equal, having each lost a great man: where- fore to avoid more bloodshed there was a necessity to pardon the Indian." [p. 18, [7]

"In June 1738 WILLIAM WYNNE, one of the justices of Brunswick County, entered for 200 acres on the southside of Dan River; and in 1746 WYNNE and others had orders of Council for 4,000 and 5,000 acres on Beaver's Creek. WILLIAM WYNNE later moved with his family to this new country; and WYNNE'S Creek of Dan River and WYNNE'S Falls where the City of Danville stands were named in his honor." [2], [7]

ELWYNNE ATNIP says that COL. WILLIAM WYNNE was one of southern Virginia's most noted men, owning nearly 100,000 acres of land. ATNIP wrote that in the early 1790's, many of the WYNNES and their kin began a journey from North Carolina through Indian Territory to Sumner Co., Tennessee. Several of them settled around Bledsoe Lick and Hickory Ridge near Lebanon. [2]

WILLIAM'S son, THOMAS WYNNE married KATE GAYLES and their great grandson, COL. ALFRED ROYAL WYNNE married ALMIRA WINCHESTER, a daughter of GENERAL JAMES WINCHESTER. ALFRED built one of the largest log structures ever erected in Tennessee, in 1828, called WYNNEWOOD. It served a stage coach inn and mineral springs resort. It is located at Castalian Springs, nine miles east of Gallatin, Tn. on State Highway #25.

WYNNEWOOD was acquired from a WYNNE descendant in 1971, by the State of Tennessee for preservation as a Historic Site. It was declared a National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service in 1973.



On a list of Tithables for Pittsylvania County, Va., taken by JOHN WILSON, Gent, in the Year 1767, there is a JOHN WYNNE listed. There is a WILLIAM WYNNE, with family members of PRINCE; PETER; NEDD; CALE; and JUDY listed on another list for 1767 taken by JOHN DIX. On this same list are the names of THOMAS WYNNE & LUCY. There is also the family of WILLIAM WYNNE, JR. with SAUNDERS SOUTHERLAND & PRINCE; and the two households of ROBERT WYNNE and THOMAS WYNNE, JR. The author hasn't been able to place these people, but feels they are near relatives since the names are the same as many in her family tree. [7-- p. 276]

As new counties were formed in Vinginia, The Church of England established parishes to coincide, since it was the established church of the colony. In the 1750's WILLIAM WYNNE, JOHN OWEN, PETER WILSON, and others, took the oath of vestrymen. Their official duties were the care of the poor and the marking of boundary lines. [7]

In Tazewell Co., Va., WILLIAM was the wealthiest man of the county. He erected a fort on his farm at Locust Hill, in Tazewell Co., Va. for the protection of the settlers.







The twin brothers, JOHN and THOMAS WYNNE/WYNN were born 9 October 1800 in Georgia, according to the 1850 Marion County, Tn. census. JOHN married MARGARET KENNEDY 23 April 1823 in Wilson Co., Tn. and soon afterwards, moved to Sweeten's Cove. Here he bought land from URIAS MARTIN; THOMAS & JOHN MAXWILL; EDWARD PANKEY; SAMUEL BEENE, MARK TOLLET, JONES McMAHON & others between the years 1824-1829. Some of this land he bought, was from the land granted to ROBERT BEAN, SR. by Tennessee State. THOMAS WYNN and OBEDIAH BEENE were witnesses. His son-in-law, JUDGE DAVID TATE, reported that JOHN BERRY WYNN owned more slaves than all the other settlers combined in Sweeten's Cove. [94]

JOHN and "PEGGY" WYNNE were members of the Primitive Baptist Church of Sweeten's Cove. It was called the Union Church, when it was organized in October 1821. [See p.33 of RAULSTON AND RUSSELL GENEALOGY, #8] for a photocopy of the 1883 Proceedings of the Sequachee Valley Association of Primitive Baptists; also see in this book, under the MARION WILSON GONCE sketch, a photocopy of the Annual Session of the Sequachee Valley Association of Primitive Baptists 1905, where M.W. GONCE is listed as a "Messenger." [28]

JOHN'S brother, THOMAS, died around 1840 and JOHN served as the executor of his estate. He sold a slave in 1842 which had belonged to THOMAS; and then bought the slave back the next day. JOHN purchased THOMAS WYNNE'S estate in Marion Co., Tn. from his l1 children. [14]

JOHN WYNNE was in his early sixties when the War Between the States broke out. JUDGE TATE reported that JOHN sold all his land for Confederate money, which made him a very poor man, since it was worthless. He died very soon after this and was buried near him home in King's Cove. The cemetery became known as the WYNNE Cemetery and is on the Marion Co., Tn. and Jackson Co., Al. State line. The War also took three of his sons; GEORGE was killed at Ft. Donelson; WILLIAM BUCK was sent home to die of jaundice; and the family never heard from JOHN, so presumed him killed in action. A few years ago MILDRED WINN "found" him in Big Flat, Arkansas. She had stopped to eat lunch and as every genealogiest does, she was asking people she met,if they knew any one by her surname. She was told about this WYNN family, which she met and found to be the descendants of JOHN, Jr. and that he hadn't been killed in the War after all. [2], [59], [139]

JOHN WYNNE died in April 1864 and is buried below a large concrete-box-like monument. Another, older looking monument of the same kind is nearby and thought by some to be that of JOHN'S brother, THOMAS. This WYNNE Cemetery is at the head of KING'S Cove, of which WILLIAM DABNEY GAINES is said to have been the 1st white settler. [p60 RAULSTON AND RUSSELL GENEALOGY] GAINES sold 400 acres to WILLIAM M. KING in 1831. The cove was then named in honor of him. KING is also buried in the WYNNE Cemetery, beneath a pile of native rock. COLONEL JAMES ROULSTON [p135] either owned this same farm, or land adjoining it. The farm is now owned by the GRIDERS, also related to the author. [8]

JOHN WYNNE'S children couldn't make up their minds how they wanted to spell their surname. Some spelled it WYNNE, others WYNN, and a few WINN. This author spelled it however it was spelled in the document she was researching.

WILLIAM WYNNE had a farm on Big Coon, later became the ALLEN farm, and is said to have been a successful farmer.

Although no official records have been found, it is family tradition that WILLIAM was a Confederate soldier, and was sent home to die of jaundice. MARTHA had to have a sale to settle the estate. Before the ink was good dry on the Court Records, she died. [See records under MARTHA COWAN sketch and also on the next pages.] WILLIAM and MARTHA left seven children; several of which were very young. MARGARET and MARY were both already married when their mother died, but guardians were named for the other five children. L.B. WINN was guardian of JOHN B. WINN and JAMES WINN; [Author doesn't know what connection NELSON KYLE had with the family or who he was] THOMAS WINN was then named guardian of JAMES WINN; PLEASANT WINN was guardian of WILLIAM WINN; and L.B. 



According to a newspaper article, W.T. "BILL" WYNNE'S "parents died when he was a small boy and he was reared by his uncle, PLEAS WYNNE. Soon after his adoption he was carried to Missouri where he lived until he reached his majority. coming back to Big Coon, he shortly married MISS SARAH JANE CARGILE on August 11, 1875." [40]

"In the year 1881 WILLIAM THOMAS WYNNE and his bride of 6 years moved to the Mt. Carmel section. Seven years later they moved to Jeffries Cove where they prospered and reared a large family." [40] W. T. & SARAH WYNNE removed to Stevenson in 1910, after their nine children were grown. He joined the Church of Christ in 1922. SARAH died in 1927 and soon after GRANDPA WYNNE suffered a stroke of paralysis and declined in health from then on until his death in 1942. [40]

GRANDPA WYNNE was 22 years old when his first child was born and 37 when the last one was born. This author was seven years old when he died at the age of 88, and was afraid of him because of his very long beard and bad health. We refer to the Bill Wynne family who lived some three-quarters of a mile southeast of the Jim Wynne family, several of whose sons are now residents of South Pittsburg and two of whom are connected with this newspaper.

While the son focused his camera on the two-story frame building shown on page three and once occupied by "Uncle Bill" and "Aunt Sally" Wynne as they were affectionately called, the roving reporter into whose category we are rapidly drifting, went to the dining room window and with an imaginary mind we peeked through and watched the nine children, together with their parents, seated at a table which fairly groaned beneath the burden of food.

"Aunt Sally" had sounded the dinner horn and the clanking of trace chains were heard as the beasts of burden, better known as mules, each mounted by his re-

spective plouboy, came up from In line with the staff's idea of the corn field in the valley below. work stock each took off to the house and to dinner. On the table from the garden, saturated with good old gravy from a country ham. Large slices of cured ham in another dish that reached half way across the table, egg bread made from the mother's own cook book and a pitcher of cold butter milk from the nearby spring, and that just about completed the menu with the exception of large helpings of blackberry cobbler as a favorite dessert.

Arch Phillips is a son of the late keeping where they now reside. Mrs. Phillips was stricken on May 1, 1955, and has been bedridden most of the time since.


PUTS LIGHT UNDER BARREL, BRINGS DOWN MR. FOX



Mr. Wynne was born near Stevenson, Alabama, November 24, 1889, the son of William T. and Sarah Cargile Wynne. He was a graduate of David Lipscomb College in Nashville before it was named David Lipscomb. On June 14, 1914 he married the former Jessie Battle Haynes of Rutherford County, Tennessee and they moved to South Pittsburg where their only child, Mary Frances, was born. While they were residents in South Pittsburg Mr. Wynne owned and operated a men's store on Cedar Avenue in the early twenties.

An accountant by profession, Mr. Wynne moved to Rosedale, Mississippi where he was employed for over fifty years by Rosedale Compress Division of Union Services Industries, Inc. With other members of the family

he helped organize the Rosedale Church of Christ. He was also an active member of the Rosedale Rotary Club and served as its secretary for a number of years.

Following the death of his wife and his retirement from business he moved to Memphis to live with his daughter and her family. And later as more nursing care was necessary, he was taken to Midsouth Christian Nursing Home where he kept busy cheering the lives of others who were handicapped with old age.

Mrs. Jessie Battle Haynes Wynne, wife of Ernest Oran Wynne, died at Kings Daughters Hospital in Greenville, Mississippi on Thursday, July 29 at 1:00 p.m., after an illness of one week.

One of the 12 children of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Haynes, she was born on October 22, 1887 at the family place near Smyrna, Tennessee, which has been in the family for some four generations.

Mrs. Wynne attended David Lipscomb College at Nashville, Tennessee, where she met Oran Wynne, a student there from Bridgeport. Alabama. They were married on June 9, 1914 at her home and celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last year in Rosedale, where they have lived for 44 years.

The Wynnes moved to South Pittsburg the first year of their marriage where Mr. Wynne was in the retail haberdasher business. They moved to Nashville in the Fall of 1918 and from Nashville they went to Mississippi Delta in the Fall of 1919, first living in Pace before moving to Rosedale in 1921. Mr. Wynne worked for the Union Compress and Warehouse Company there for 36 years until his retirement in 1957.



After teaching school for several years, GRANDMOTHER GONCE married at age 22, had her first child at 23 and last child at 45. She was 83 when she died. [68], [69]

Living as a widow for 30 years, NANCY WYNNE GONCE ran the family farm with the help of several of her children. She always had a big garden, sold eggs and butter, and had a large flock of geese which she "picked" to make down mattresses and pillows. She cooked on an old wood stove in which she made delicious tea cakes, that she kept in a big cookie jar. [67]

NANCY WYNNE lived in a big country farm house, part of which had been a log house at first. As the house was added on to, the logs were covered up and the house ended up with two seperate upstairs. She always had a house full of children and grandchildren, who were given chores to do, which helped her out and really made the little ones feel big. This author's job was to go out in the pasture to pick berries for the fruit cobblers that GRANDMOTHER cooked. The grandchildren particularly liked to ring the dinner bell to call the men out of the fields, to come eat.

Water was piped to a sink on the back porch from a spring. Back behind the house was a log smoke house, and beyond that was a large log barn. In the other direction, a short ways from the house, was the outdoor "John." A three seater, the best the author can remember.

The author was taught to knit (on pencils for the lack of needles at the time) by her grandmother. She has a quilt made by NANCY WYNNE GONCE which hangs on a wall of the author's bedroom. The ELIZABETH part of the author's name is in honor of her grandmother, NANCY ELIZABETH WYNNE.





- 82. BEAN-ROULSTON CEMETERY, Sweeten's Cove Rd. near South Pittsburg, Tn. Several Gonce, Wynne, & Beene cousins are buried here.
- 83. CARGILE CEMETERY, east of Stevenson, Al. on McMahan Rd. It is dangerous to walk in this old cemetery since most of the graves are so sunken down. The author was able to find the graves of Elder John A. & Nancy Cargile and perhaps some of their children.
- 84. CARGILE CEMETERY, near Billy Hall's house on Crow Creek out from Stevenson, Al.
 - P. W. Cargile (1819-1887) is buried in this cemetery.
- 85. CONDRA MEMORIAL CEMETERY, near Whitwell, Tn.
 Augustus Austin Hackworth (1746-1847) and wife; Austin & Elizabeth Rigney Hackworth; Elizabeth & Jasper; Levi & Dicy; and William Henry Harrison Hackworth's markers were all photographed. There are many, many more Hackworths, Condras, & etc. buried in this neat cemetery.
- 86. CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CEMETERY, near Little Crow Creek near Gonce, Al. In this well kept cemetery, the author was able to find many of her kin. Pictures were taken of the tombstones of Marion Wilson Gonce & Nancy E. Wynne Gonce; of Oran & Alley Gonce, of Mary Hackworth G. Arnold, of Newton Hackworth; of Elizabeth Hardy & James Matthews, Sr.; and James Matthews, Jr.
- 87. HACKWORTH CEMETERY, behind Edgefield Church on Old Stevenson Rd., AL. Many Hackworths here.
- 88. MT. CARMEL CEMETERY, off Old Stevenson Rd. near Doran's Cove Rd., AL.
- Several Griders, Matthews, and Wynnes are buried here.

 89. OLD BAPTIST CEMETERY, Crow Creek Valley near Anderson,
 Tn., across Al. State Line in Jackson Co., Al.
 Briers and thorny bushes are so bad here, that they make it
 impossible to get to most graves. Many stones were knocked
 down when the area was logged years ago. The author was
 able to take pictures of the graves of Randolph M. Gonce &
 Mary A.L. Gonce inside the stone wall. Isaac Gonce, Franky
 Wilson Gonce, Elizabeth Gonce, and Wilson T. Gonce all have
 markers in front of pilled up stones, but are so overgrown

- the author couldn't get near them. Nancy Gonce provided her with old pictures of the graves, from which an artist, Debbie Lindsey, did pen & ink sketches. Randolph Gonce is also buried here, but has no marker. There are a number of Hackworth graves near the road which are easier to reach.
- ROUND TOP CEMETERY, near Falkville (Morgan Co.) Al. The author made a picture of the tombstone of Dr. Nichodemus Hackworth, grandson of Augustus Austin Hackworth.
- STEVENSON CITY CEMETERY, north east part of Stevenson, Al. Here the author made pictures of Sarah Jane Cargile & William T. "Bill" Wynne's, and Mary Jeannette Wynne & Dr. Jas. A. Gentry's tombstones inside a neat wrought iron
- WYNNE CEMETERY, at head of King's Cove off Rocky Springs 92. Rd. near Bridgeport, Al. Pictures were made of the large concrete-box-like monument which covers the grave of John Wynne (1800-1864). [not sure where Peggy Kennedy is buried since she probably died in Marshall Co., Al. after 1880. Inscription can't be read on two of the monuments. Some people believe that one is the grave of Thomas, John's twin brother. John's son, L.G. Wynne & wife; and John Berry Wynne & Julia Lassater Wynne's graves are near by. There is another very old grave marked by a heaped-up pile of native rock. This is said to be that of William King, for whom the cove was named. The author was upset when she saw that there was no fence around this cemetery, in the middle of a horse and cattle pasture. But after seeing the Old Baptist Cemetery in such terrible shape, decided it was better to have animals keeping the briers and weeds down.

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


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


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
