Some of the trustees were J. L. Wynne, C. L. Rash, Avery Lovelady, Bob Matthews, Charlies Allen, and I. E. Lovelady.

History of the Cave Springs Church, Little Coon Valley, Alabama



The people of Cave Springs started going to Church a long time ago in a little log cabin. In 1893, Issac Matthews gave two acres of land for a church building. Augustus L Sentell II, Leroy Rash, Thomas Lovelady and James Monroe Sentell helped construct the Cave Springs Church building. It has had many pastors and members. Some of the previous pastors were Rev. Howell, Mike Hill, Fred McClendon, T J Dilbeck, C L Barnett, Crawford Morris, Henry Guinn and J B Igou.

The church was used for a school house until 1915 when a school house was built next to the church (note: school was located in the southwest corner of the church property). The church has members scattered ove the US, One of Isaac Matthews granddaughters lives in Oregon, one in Washington DC one in Indiana, and one in Birmingham, Al. (note: these four are daughters of James Monroe Sentell and Francis Miscal Matthews Sentell). The oldest granddaughter is Mrs. Nannie Morris of Stevenson who is 95 years old and lives with a grandson Mack Morris.

Cave Springs church has produced some fine citizens, Dr. Jessie Lee Prince came to Cave Springs Community from Paint Rock Valley at the age of 20. Augustus Sentell II, built Dr. Prince an office at the back of the Sentell house. (note: currently owned by Augustus descendants of Pam Tucker and sister Debbie). Dr. Prince worked here for several years before moving to Stevenson. Dr. James H Sentell, son of James Monroe Sentell and Francis, grandson of Isacc Matthews, (no other comments are on this manuscript, so he is just another fine citizen produced at cave springs)

Alvis "Babe" Austin, a former member homesteaded land under Andrew Jackson. Mr. Austin became a minister, sold his land to James Luther Sentell and moved to Texas. Mr. James

Newspaper Search:

Jul 3, 1902 PA: Cave Springs News. "The school at this place is moving nicely under the management of Mr. Gentry. It seems that all the obstacles has been removed, and it is hoped that the people of this place will awaken to the needs of their children to such an extent that they may become as growing and living monuments to the loving zeal and altruistic spirit of noble men and sympathetic women."

Sep 19, 1902 PA: Cave Spring News. "Our school under the management of J. A. Gentry will close Friday 19."

Nov 13, 1902 PA: Rash News. "Miss Canna Wynn began the public school at Cave Spring Monday."

Feb 5, 1925 PA: "Temperance Days was observed at Cave Spring school Friday afternoon and a very interesting program was rendered. Those who were on the honor roll for January were as follows: Sixth grade—Rena McCrary, Jimmie Lee Matthews, and Carl Champion."

Nov 17, 1927 PA: Sixth-grader Julia Faye Wynne wrote Miss Hayes, the editor of the short-lived Progressive Age school page. "Olalee, Alabama, October 31, 1927, Dear Miss Haynes: Cave Spring School had a splendid Hallowe'en program and supper Saturday night. We sold pieces, cakes, candy, and sandwiches. The amount we made was thirty-eight dollar and ninth cents. We want to get a library, book case, and other things. Yours truly, Julia Faye Wynne, Sixth grade pupil of Cave Spring School".

Said district contains 25, 26, 27, 34, 35, 36, Tp 1, R 6; section 5 and 6, Tp 2, R 7; also section 1, and the east ½ of section 2, Tp 2, R 6; also section 31, Tp 1, R 7. All of said district being in Jackson County, Ala.
