The school needs a pump for well. 1950 and Progressive Age, Jul 31, 1952 The first mention of "Fackler Rosenwald" school was January 29, 1931 when the Progressive Age reported that the average attendance at the school was 92%. The same high figure was reported in March. The school was profiled as "Fackler Negro School" in the 1950 survey of county schools in the Jackson County Sentinel.

And in July 1952, the Progressive Age ran a series of notices that the Fackler Colored School Building would be sold. The bid covered only the building "as the land reverts back to the original quarantor."

FACKLER SCHOOL The Fackler Negro School is located a quarter of a mile west of Fackler, Jackson County. In this school are taught the first six grades. The trustees are Dennis Little, Maryland Timberlake and Geo. Reasor. The teacher is Inez Stewart. The seventeen students enrolled are as follows: first grade, 3; third grade, 6; fourth grade, fifth grade, 2; sixth grade, The average attendance is 15. All students work on farms, and attend school at Hollywood after finishing their work here. The school building consists of two classrooms, a large playground, one cloakroom and two outdoor toilets.
