

There was in 1923 a smaller Rosalie School #2 where Eunice Griffin taught and W. F. Wilks of Henegar was the only trustee.

The current web site for Rosalie Elementary School includes this history of Rosalie School:

Rosalie School began in the 1890's. Formerly known as Pleasant Hill School, Rosalie School was held in Pleasant Hill Church. Pleasant Hill Church was located where Rosalie Baptist Church now sits. Mr. Luther Dean acted as pastor of Rosalie Baptist Church and principal of Pleasant Hill School (Rosalie School). Rosalie School (shown here) was built around 1924.





Students attended school in this building for about ten years, until the school burned in about 1936. As a result of the fire, students again attended school in the church until a new building was completed in 1939. Note: The school website says this 1924 building burned but it is still shown as Rosalie School in the 1950 education supplements.

When the surrounding schools - Shrader School, Octavia School, Central School, and Spring Hill School - closed in the 1930's and 1940's, many of those students began attending Rosalie School. The present school building was constructed in 1967. Rosalie School has continued to make new additions - classrooms, library, and a gymnasium. The current Rosalie Elementary School is shown below.

The first newspaper reference to the school is **October 7, 1909**. The school opened with 70 students and "the large and commodious school house was filled with patrons and friends of the school." School teacher from Langston and Section and later newspaper editor and Probate Judge Jim Benson delivered an hour-long sermon about liquor people trying "to gain control of the legislature...ruining and wrecking

Pleasant Hill School Opens. Rosalio, Ala., Oct. 4. The Pleasant Hill school, near Resalie, opened Monday with most flattering prospects with an enrollment of 70. At 10 o'clock the large and commodious school house was filled with patrons and friends of the school. After devotional exergises conducted by Mr. Wheeler, Jas. S. Benson, of Section, was imtroduced to the audience and spoke for one hour along educational ilnes defending the fast legislature in their expenditures and earnestly and eloquently pleading with the people to ratify the proposed amendment to the constitution thereby destroying all hopes of the liquor people to again gain control of a legislature and again resume their nefarious practice of raining and wrecking homes in our state, He presented the subject plainly and numbers of citizens who have openly opposed the amendment expressed themselves as favoring it. The people of Pleasant Hill; will long remember the address made by Mr. Benson.


