#### CLASS HISTORY

The memory of the succession of happenings which have occurred to this Senior Class of 1936 since we entered Jr. III in 1932 will be treasured by each of us through the succeeding days of our lives.

We were lead through our first year of high school by Ward Proctor, a boy who was to serve in the capacity of president to our class for three years. Among the happenings of importance during that year were the construction of the new Vocational Building and the graduation of the first class in it and the closing of school at the end of three months. A subscription school enabled most of us to complete our year's work. This first year of our inexperience with Mrs. Julian Hodges as our sponsor, passed swiftly, and we entered school in the fall of 1933 as Sophmores. We felt somewhat more important in our first year of senior high school than we had as Junior III's. Again we looked to Ward Proctor as president, and Mrs. Hodges as sponsor, for guidance. As time sped on, school closed again, ending another successful lap of our journey.

September again. And we found ourselves, as Juniors, only one step from our goal. Again Ward took up his faithful duty as class president. It seems that this class must think lots of this football hero to put our ship in charge of his capable hands for three years in succession. With Miss Jean Bradford (to become Mrs. Bob Howland before the end of the year) in charge, we started a new movement in the social activities of our dear old school, and successfully entertained the Seniors of '35 with the Junior-Senior banquet on April 18. On May 14, 1935, the Junior play, "Kicked Out of College", was presented, with Charlie Webb taking the lead and supported by Carolyn Spivey, Blanche McCutchen, Fay McGuffey, Frances Patrick, William Smith, Ward Proctor, Joe Middleton and a number of others. When we parted in the spring of 1935, it was with the realization that when we met again, we would be on the top rung of our ladder of "High School Education."

September 9, 1935. We met again, Seniors at last, with the welcome news that Mrs. I.J. Browder, one of the best loved members of the faculty, was to be our sponsor. When we were first assembled in home room, we looked about us, and discovered that among others dear to us that we had lost during our upward journey were Carolyn Spivey and J.C.Jacobs, leaders among us throughout our school career. They had chosen other schools in which to complete their education. We elected Clyde Harper, President; Marian Bradford, Vice-President; Blanche McCutchen, Secretary; and Ward Proctor, Treasurer of the class. Our class has grown from the smallest in school to one of the largest, having 61 students in it this year. During the year we have lost only one member and gained one, keeping the number the same. The class and school as a whole suffered one misfortune this year, the loss of our Chief Counselor since we first entered high school, Mr. I.J. Browder. He left us to take a higher position, that of state senator. Mr. Browder was very efficiently replaced by Mr. W.R. Riley, who has been all to us that a friend and principal could be. He has helped us over many rocky, difficult places since he took charge.

The Class of '36 has obtained many honors. We have six members of the National Honor Society: Vickey Swaim, Frances Patrick, Mary Jo Raney, Emma Lou Larkin, Jennie Lee Kelley, and Tom Precise; three members of the girls' basketball team: Marian Rose Ryan, Bessie B. Wright, and Ruby Dilbeck; three members of the boys' basketball team: Jack Johnston, J. Selley McGriff, and Charles Simmons; and seven football boys: J. Selley McGriff, Charles Simmons, Joe Middleton, Leonard Precise, Hobson Porter, Tom Precise, and Ward Proctor, one of the co-captains of this year's team.

Our senior class has achieved success in another field, also. We published this year the third volume of the Jackson County High School annual, The Reminder. This is the first volume for the past five years, as no other senior class would attempt such a task.

Our high school days as a whole have been a big success. During our upward struggle we have both gained and lost fellow-classmen. Though always sorry to lose anyone, we were glad to welcome a new member to our fold. May the memory of our teachers, classmates, and class activities be cherished by all and be freshened often by the Reminder.
