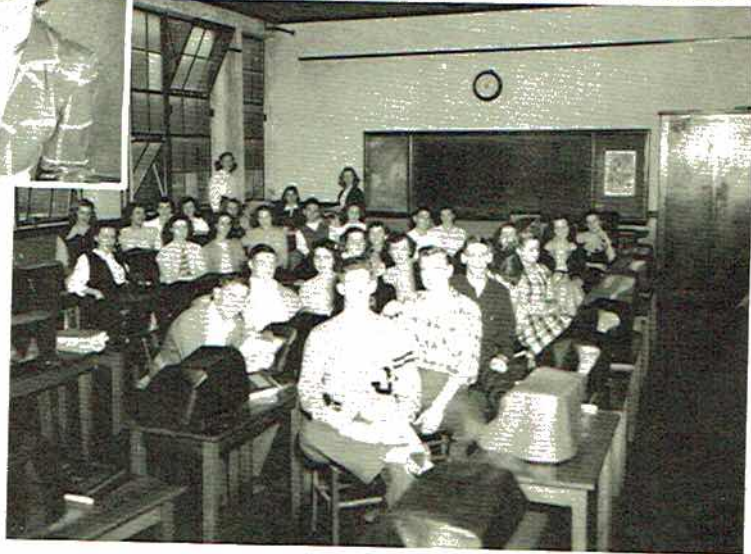
The cost of four lights in each room is around \$125. If the veterans had not done the painting of the ceilings themselves the labor bill plus the lights would have been around \$175 for each room.

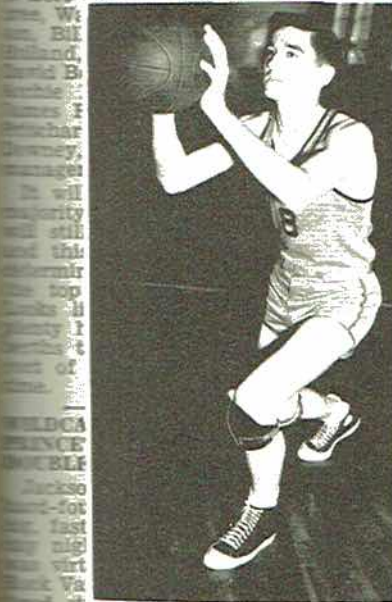

Scottsboro Gets East

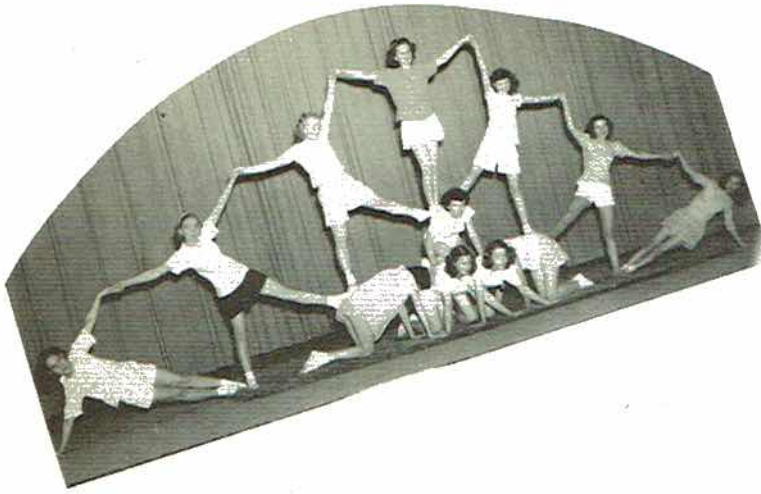
