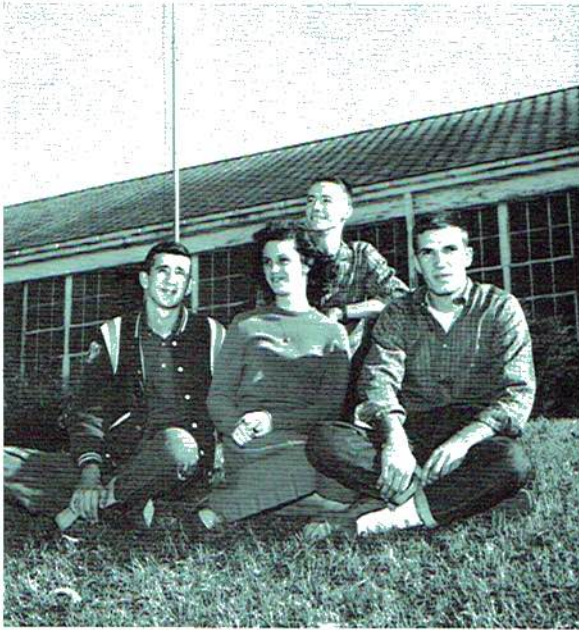
So, it is as one small actor in this complex drama that I shall always find my greatest reward. I am glad to have been one of you, and I shall continue my involvement with you wherever I go.

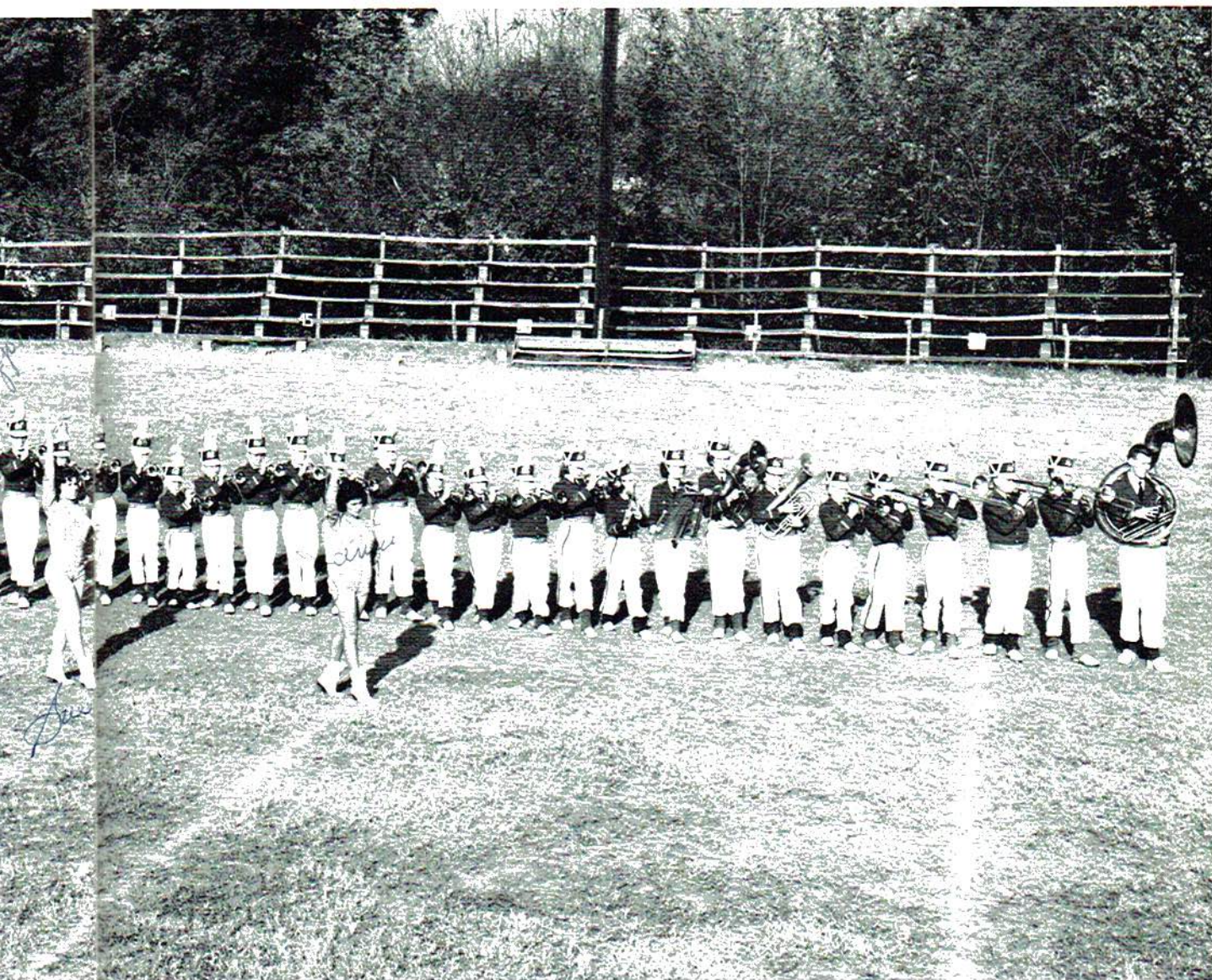


The Future Farmers of America

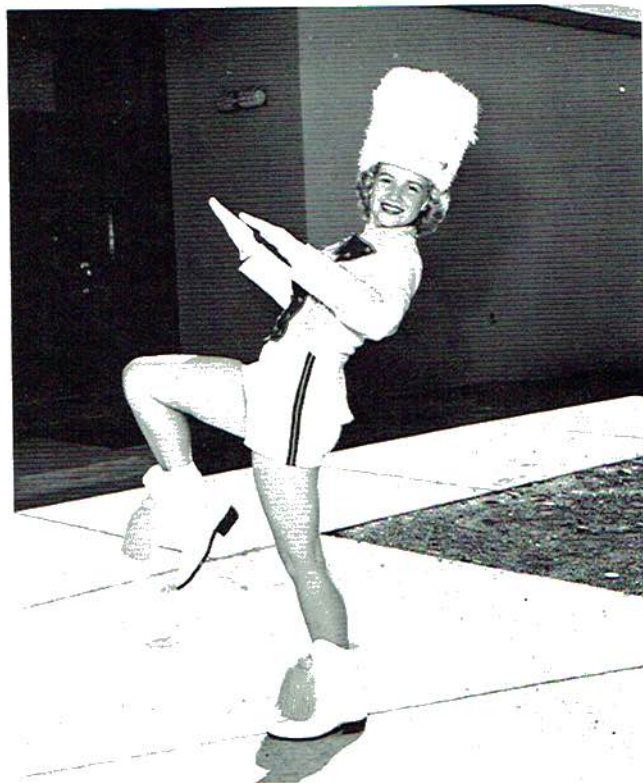

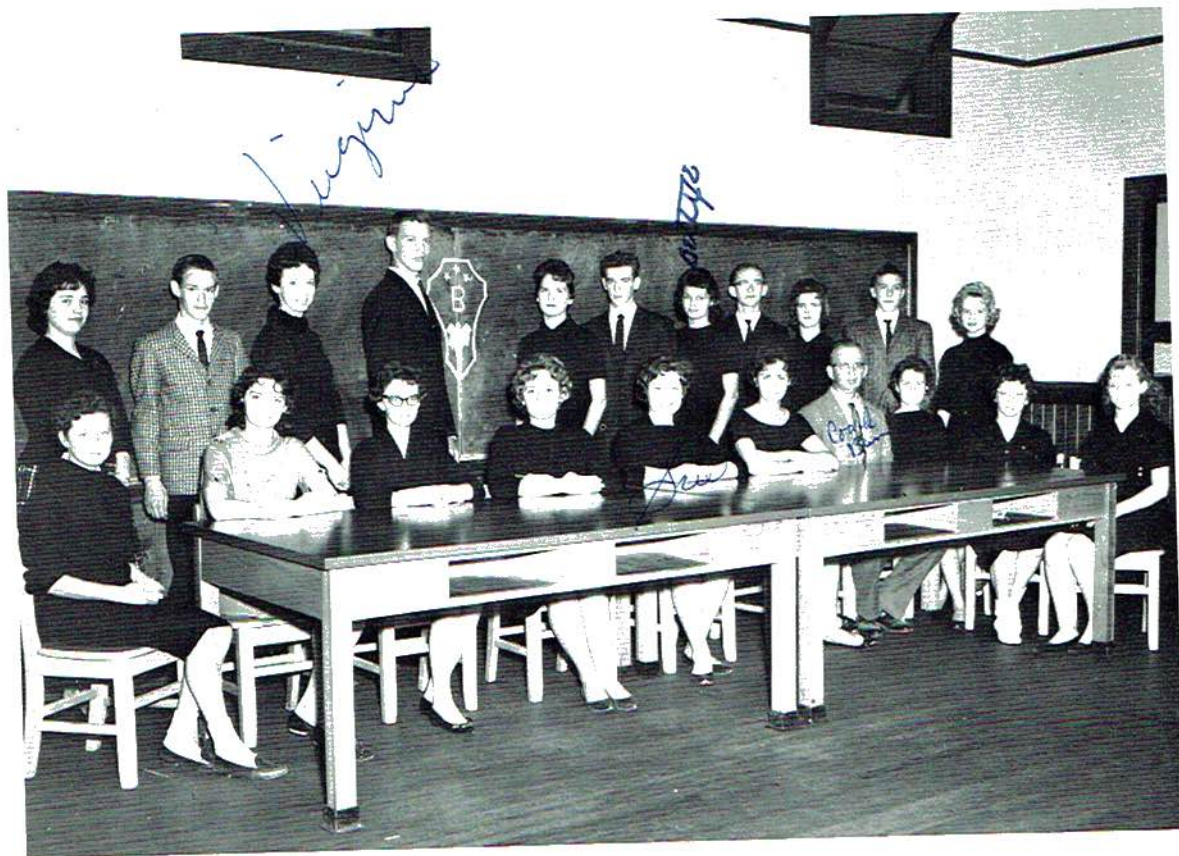

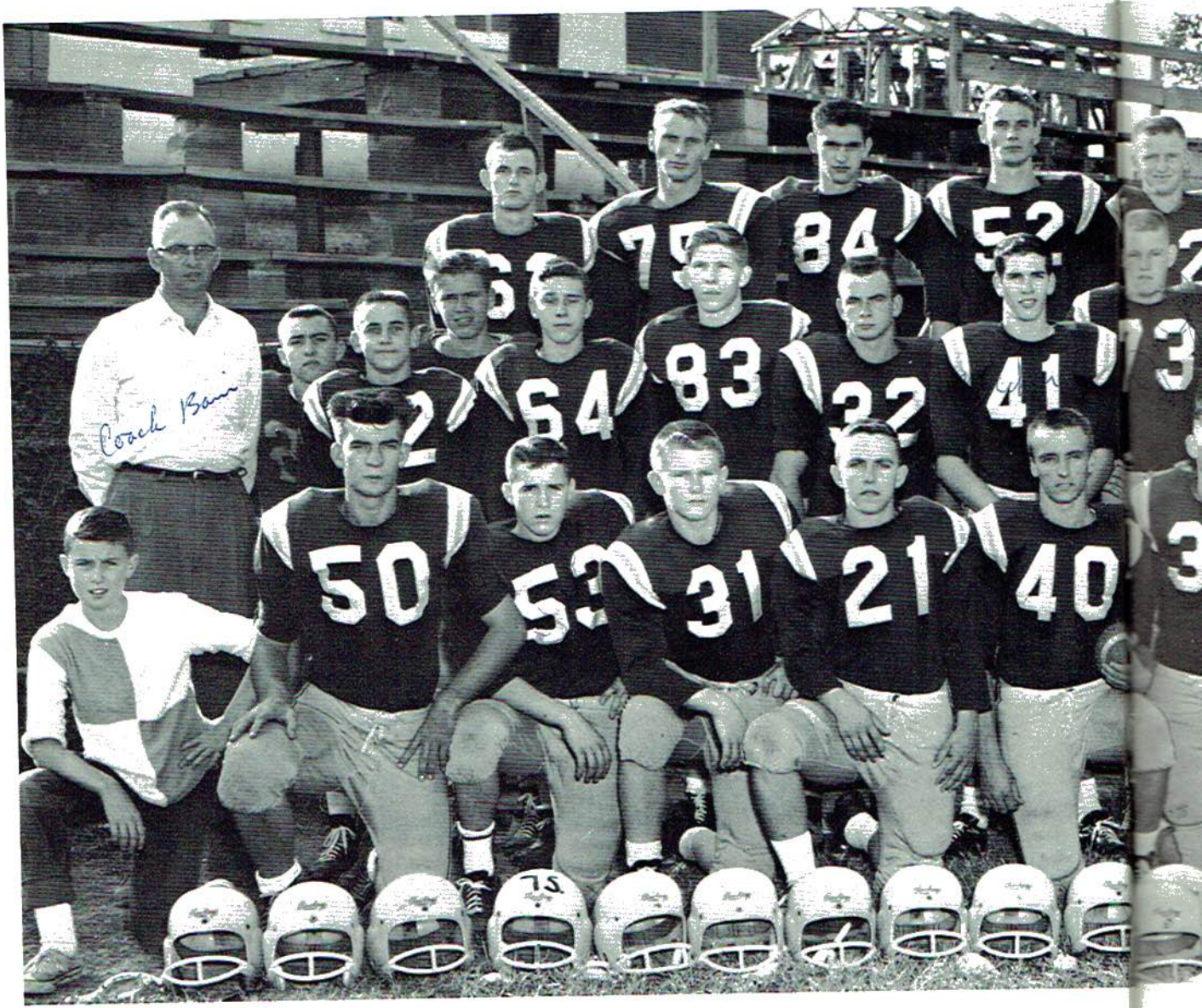
The Beta Club

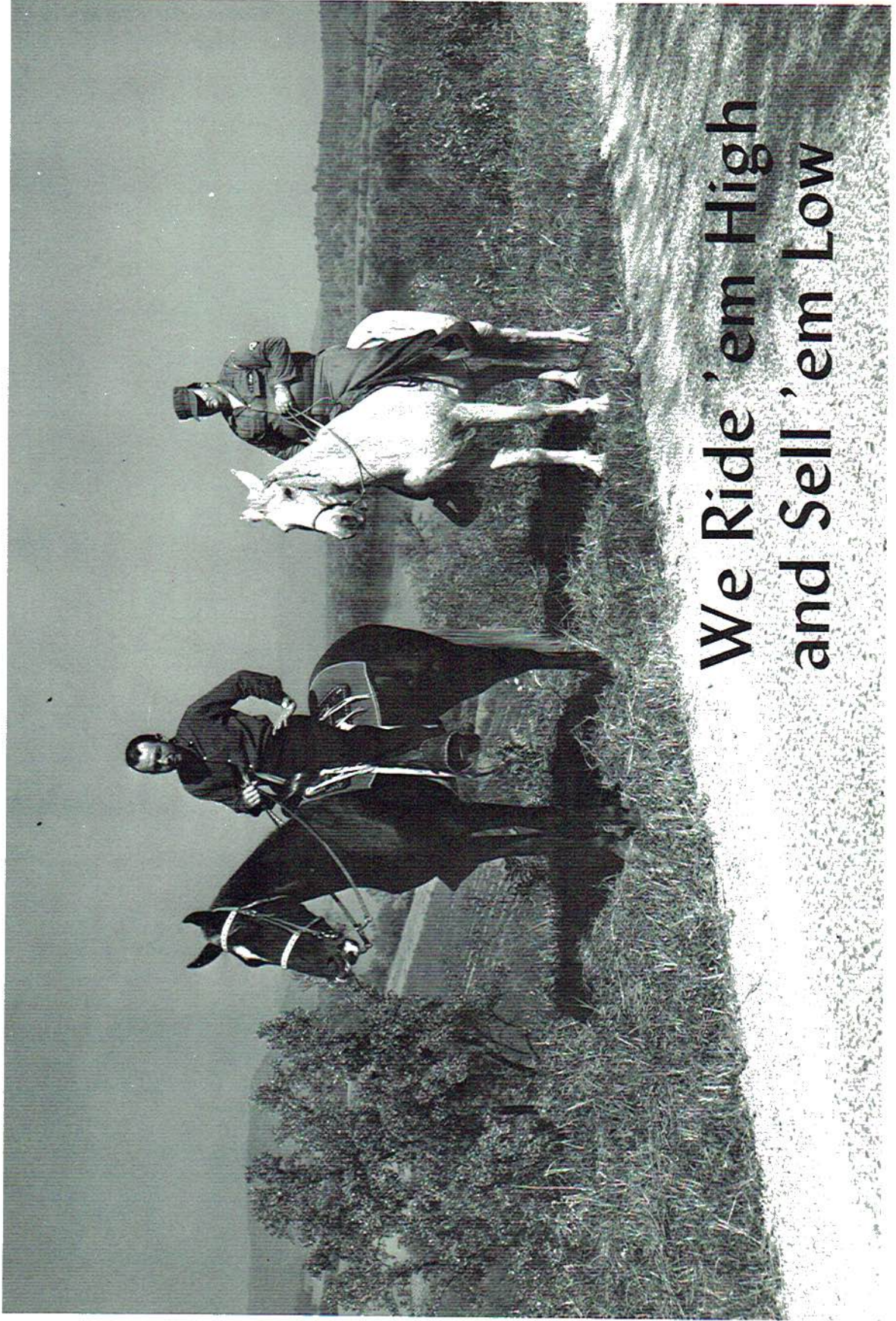
