


This Is Where We Belong

rivalry, but isn't that part of being a family?










Although we were finally getting loose from this "prison," we had grown so close that we thought it was sad to be leaving.




To Laud Received


Cap and gown clad seniors solemnly stepped closer to the end of high school days as they trod down the aisle on Honors Day, May 18, 1984.






For the Good Times






Dedicated Mentors



Besides teaching us English, math, science and history, they join our parents in teaching us honor, respect, dependability, honesty, and integrity.









Faculty Facts

These thirty-two students came together and supported one another during times of victory and times of defeat. "THEY KEPT THE FIRE BURNING!"





Although the overall record was not one of outstanding merit, they proved that the games lost were not as important as the games that were won. For it was these games that led them to the county playoffs.




Future Homemakers of America














How Can I














Our year was one filled with both victory and defeat, happiness and gloom, love and heartaches, friendship and anger. It was part of growing up. And we were happy to have shared the experience.

The juniors took first place again this year with the sophomores close behind. The junior high got some recognition with the eighth grade taking home the third place seat.





group.


