We will always remember our Alma Mater to which we will be---

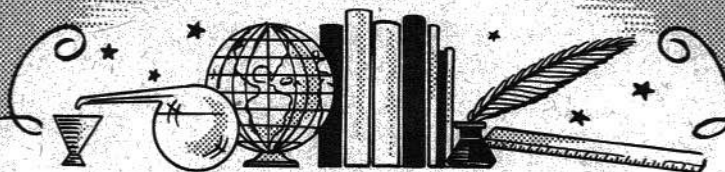

I, Carlos Smith Jr. bequeath unto Edsel Crowell my basketball whistle.

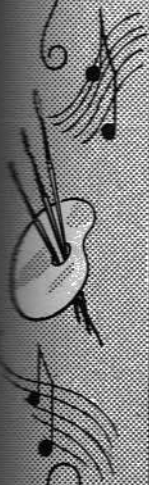
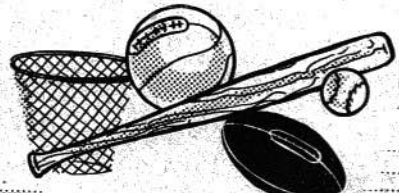
