

Next Year's editor, assistant editor, and business manager have been elected for the Wildcat.



**EDITORIALS**

The front page of this last issue of our school paper is the cover sheet from a "Wildcat" twenty-five years ago this month. Nineteen-forty four was the first year for the "Wildcat;" this was during World War II when all photographic supplies were rationed. The printing was done on the school duplicating machine, all except the pages which had pictures.

The editor for the 1943-1944 "Wildcat" was George Ricker, the assistant editor was W.H. Lockard, and the business manager was Vivian Stubbs.

The students aren't the only people around who have been loyal to the "Wildcat"—many of our advertisers are still with us. Some of our advertisers that first year were: Word Lumber Company, Coplin Hardware, Harbin Motor Company, Hodges Drug Store, Word Motor Company, The Children's Shoppe (now the Ladie's and Children's Shoppe), the Jackson County Sentinel, and Wales Jewelers.

Although the yearbook edition of the "Wildcat" contained forty pages, most of the eight pages from that year consisted of only two or three typed pages; ads were fifty cents to a dollar.

The ratio of girls to boys that year was about four to one in the senior class; the war had called almost all of our older students to defend their country.

Scottsboro High School has come a long way since 1944; the last twenty-five years have seen the graduating class triple, we gained a new high school building only last year, and Scottsboro High School now has a teaching and administrative faculty made up of 42 capable leaders.

The "Wildcat" has made progress too. It has grown from the two page type-written paper of twenty-five years ago to a four to twelve page printed paper. The total expenditures of the "Wildcat" have amounted to over \$1,100 this year in publishing eight papers. Our current circulations is about 900.

We, the members of the "Wildcat" staff, sincerely hope that the "Wildcat" will continue to grow with Scottsboro High School, and that you have enjoyed our school paper this year.

We wish to thank you, the students of Scottsboro High School, for making this paper "a project long to be remembered" for the last twenty-five years.

His hobbies include skiing, fishing, billiards, hunting, horse-back riding, baseball, track, football, bowling, golf, tennis and hockey.







Barry Talley leaps the high hurdle for the Scotties. Talley came in third, followed by Frederick Edmondson.

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
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
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


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


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
