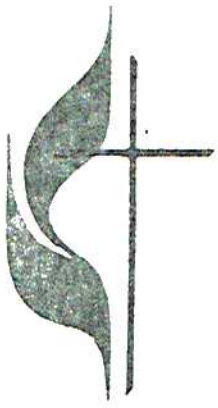

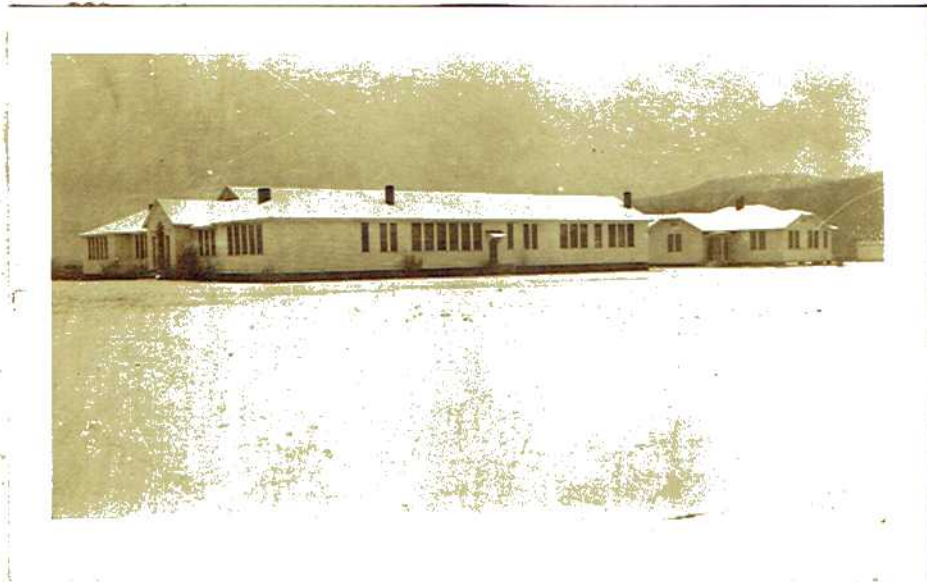


Rev. Propst asked me to send this book to you as a gift from him to the school. He thought you might like to have this for the archives of the school.

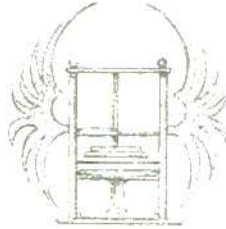
